Pedagogy: More than just a music lesson

Learning is an indigenous educational system in Manding culture. Famoro and Kanazoe began their apprenticeship at the age of 7. This is how they developed their humanity. It's very rare for Europeans to learn in this style. In the Manding Grooves workshop, we blend African and European styles. While learning the balafon, the teachers impart values and qualities such as patience, concentration, coordination, grace, listening, respect, and a sense of community. These are values that we can integrate into our daily lives. With the assistance of Lisa Feder and other more experienced individuals, we will have the opportunity to explore and practice the rich spiritual culture of the jelis around different themes during the week.

Seydou "Kanazoe" Diabaté, from the Semla group of Burkina Faso, currently residing in France, began learning the balafon from his father at the age of seven. He plays both pentatonic and diatonic balafon. He is known for his creative, dynamic, and fast-paced style. He has been teaching and performing in Europe for over ten years. He is the leader of the band "Kanazoe Orkestra."





<u>Famoro Dioubate</u>, originally from Guinea Conakry, has been residing in New York City for 25 years. Born into a prestigious Kouyaté/Dioubaté family, he is known for his clarity and grace in the traditional style of Guinea. He is the leader of the New York-based group "Kakande."

These two artists were born into jeli families and were recognised from a young age for their exceptional talent. They are virtuosos in their art. We are fortunate that they enjoy sharing their knowledge with Europeans and Americans. They excel in the art of guiding each individual towards discovering their own grace.

Lisa Feder is an American anthropologist specialising in the study of the jeli (griot) educational system. Author of the book "Jeliya at the Crossroads", soon to be translated into French, she has studied under Famoro Dioubaté since 2005. Settled in France since 2015, she has created Manding Grooves with Famoro Dioubaté to support jelis in their journey in Europe and the United States. She believes in the power of music to bring people together across borders. She believes in learning as an ancient system for developing well-balanced human beings. She is also a spiritual practitioner, primarily in Buddhism. For Lisa Feder, jeliya, human development, and spirituality are inseparable.
